This winter and spring we developed a succession plan, and the board selected Beth Corsa as Valentine's replacement. Most of you know that Beth has served as our administrator for 15 years. She will take on both program advising and administration as our first Executive Director and solo employee. Beth has attended countless site visits, board meetings, conferences, and is already stepping into leadership and guidance this spring, especially needed during this health and economic crisis. What a way to start out!

We also have a new board member, Kolu Zigbi. She was Program Officer with the Noyes Foundation for many years, and a leader in Food Systems strategies and grantmaking. We are incredibly delighted to have her expertise, talent, and heart added to our ranks.

Finally, and least perceptibly, I have succeeded Lucy Miller as Chair of the Board. I am grateful to serve during this time as we enter our fourth decade and look to grow our impact and empower lasting social change to protect quality of life and the environment in the Northeast and beyond.
